Priority Species

Scarce Blue-tailed Damselfly – at SX569640, 5 (1 ovipositing) on 23/6/05; C adults on 11/7/05; and 13 (10 males; 1 pair *in cop*.) were marked by a team of 3 on 8/7/06. In the same general area, on 14/7/05, 6 were found at SX565644 and 10 at SX573641. On 15/7/18, at least 35 were seen in the Blackaton Cross area, but only 8 in 2023 after drought.

Other species of note

Common Hawker – small numbers noted, but exuviae and emergents found in 2010 and egglaying in 2019.

Black Darter – only small numbers seen, maximum 6-20 on 23/8/19.

Habitat

2005: Open, sheep-grazed moorland with old workings and flushes flowing from below Great Trowlesworthy Tor. The southernmost valley was dry or damp, with abundant *Sphagnum* and other mosses. The easternmost was wet and from the confluence the valley contained a fast-flowing stream, often in an incised channel, which flows down to the River Plym. A small colony of Scarce Blue-tailed Damselflies was found on an open, flat area to the east of the main stream. This area contained several small, shallow pools and runnels with scattered sparse mire vegetation.

Status Area c70 ha.


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Threats


Overgrazing may be a threat, but helpful in maintaining open, muddy areas favoured by Scarce Blue-tailed Damselfly.
