Priority Species History

Ruddy Darter – 'good numbers' reported prior to 1995, often more than Common Darter: 20+ territorial males in 1994; three males and one pair *in cop*. (and probably some of eight Darters taking maiden flights) on 14/8/95. Said to have been recorded annually up to 2005, in the same areas, sometimes outnumbering Common Darters (but no more than 5 reported).

Other species of note

Keeled Skimmer - reported in 1995 as breeding 'in recent years'.

Habitat

Five pools (two very new in 1995) in a sheltered, wooded valley. *p*H: 6.4-7.3 (6.9 in Ruddy Darter lake) on 29/7/95; conductivity: 90-120 μ S/cm (20/7/95). All ponds dredged out since 1991, with major machine dredging of main lake and Kingfisher Pond. Leat also renovated; *p*H 7.2 and 7.7 (29.7.95) and conductivity 100 and 130 μ S/cm (20/7/95). Major *Rhododendron* clearance programme and selective tree thinning has also opened up wetlands since 1991. Submerged species: *Potamogeton natans*, *Callitriche* sp.. Emergents: *Sparganium erectum*, *Iris psuedacorus*, *Butomus umbellatus*, *Mimulus* sp., *Ranunculus lingua*. Small acidic marginal flushes: *Sphagnum* (rare), *Carex paniculata* (occasional). Also stream to north and south (*p*H 7.8 and conductivity 100 μ S/cm in the latter) and mire ('The Wetland'). *ca.* 50 Rudd in the main lake.

No major changes apparent since 1995.


Threats

Management suggestions

- Occasional, small-scale desilting of ponds, on long rotation.
- Continued rotational thinning of marginal woodland to create sunny margins.
- Continued Rhododendron clearance.
