Priority Species History

Scarce Blue-tailed Damselfly –1 reported on 19/6/01 and unquantified presence on 7/7/03, 26/6/05 and 7/8/05 (records from the late Andy Stevens, then with Plymouth CC) A late-season follow-up survey on 30/7/07 produced 18 (7 in the marshy area, 8 at one pool and 3 at another); of these, 12 were males, 2 of the remaining females were teneral (form *aurantiaca*) and at least 1 old, implying recent emergences and possibly the first UK evidence of a second generation; in addition 2 exuviae were found at one pond. At just 10m ASL, this site is likely to be the lowest in the UK.

Habitat

Derelict quarry, with marsh (especially at SX51885462) and pools on bare quarry floor. At the time of survey in 2007, it was believed the land would be destroyed by housing development.
